The Student Handbook passed out during the first day of school addresses the MO Learning Standards, the MO Assessment Program, local assessments and working with educators to improve student performance and achievement. The faculty also meets with parents several times during the year such as during Open House, parent teacher conferences, personal phone calls, or to finalize Reading Action Plans. The faculty is committed to providing assistance to parents to monitor their child's progress and to improve their child's achievement. Parents have access to grades at all times. Parents also have the opportunity to receive instant results on reading assessments via emails.

During preschool/kindergarten screenings, children along with their families are introduced to the kindergarten teachers. Family meet and greet for incoming Kindergarten students and parents.
